BACKGROUND

- As the population ages, an increasing amount of individuals will die in long-term care (LTC) homes
- Despite this increasing statistic, current palliative approach models are not well suited for LTC settings and the frail, elderly population they aim to serve

RESEARCH TOPIC

 To analyze components of the current palliative model of care in LTC and refine them for use within a Canadian context

METHODOLOGY

- Using a sequential mixed methods design, this study completed a scoping review; this assisted in the development of the Strengthening a Palliative Approach in Long-Term Care (SPA-LTC) model
- A stakeholder analysis was completed with both quantitative (surveys) and qualitative (focus groups) components

KEY FINDINGS

- 46 articles related to palliative programs, training/capacity building, family support, advance care planning (ACP), and goals of care were included in the scoping review
- 21 LTC staff provided feedback about the model to guide revisions
- 35 key stakeholders endorsed the importance of all activities of the SPA-LTC model, but questioned its feasibility to introduce the palliative approach concept and begin ACP discussions with family members and residents in an LTC environment

CONCLUSION

- The SPA-LTC model was well-received and endorsed by a variety of LTC stakeholders, including staff, decision-makers, and researchers
- Future emphasis needs to be placed on the integration of ACP discussions in LTC
