Champion lead making headway in Alberta

Lisa Bailey joined SPA-LTC as a champion lead in January 2024 but has quickly made substantial progress within the program. She has contacted over 192 long-term care homes or organizations. Outreach continues to be an ongoing process.



Lisa has been working with two phenomenal long-term homes in Alberta. Generations is privately owned and Canmore General Hospital Golden Eagle View Long Term Care Unit is provincially funded. Generations is currently implementing e-learning modules from SPA-LTC and Canmore is at the beginning stages of implementing the program.

Spotlight on Golden Eagle View Long-Term Care



Lisa has been working with the Golden Eagle View Long Term Care Unit at the Canmore General Hospital. It is a 23 bed Type A continuing care facility in the community. Kathie Scheel is Canmore's long-term care (LTC) manager and educator.

Kathie was introduced to SPA-LTC after attending a presentation that Lisa provided to the Calgary Rural LTC Educators. Kathie was inspired by the presentation and shared samples of the resources at a resident/family council meeting. Families and staff were keen to learn more about it.

Lisa and Kathie worked together and developed a plan for implementing SPA-LTC in Canmore. During the planning stage, Lisa met with the palliative champion team lead and the nursing team. The palliative champion team and staff are eager to collaborate to improve a palliative approach at Golden Eagle View LTC.

Spotlight on Generations

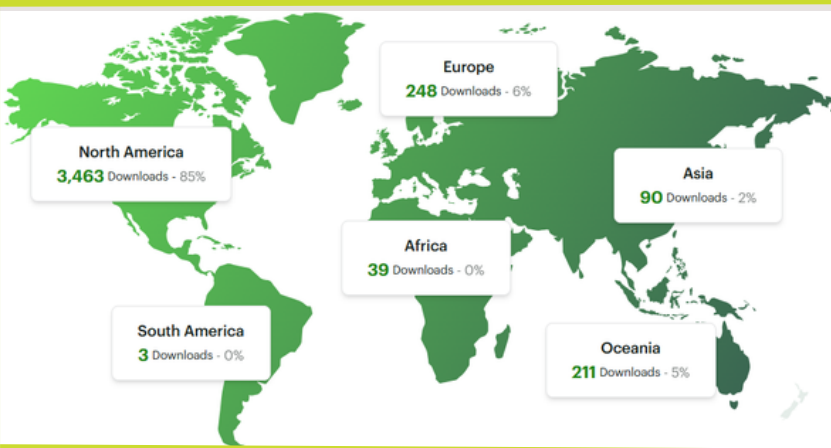
Generations Calgary is a not-for-profit Campus of Care that is home to 180 residents, living in Long-Term Care (Type A) or Supportive Living (Type B).

In the winter of 2024, Generations launched an e-learning initiative. Staff were asked to complete one module from the Family-Centered Care education modules or the SPA-LTC per month during their shifts. Each module is followed by a debriefing session to solidify learning and application in daily care practices.

The e-learning modules have been instrumental in supporting staff at Generations to have earlier discussions about palliative care and have more confidence and compassion when providing palliative care to residents. Furthermore, the staff also recognize their role in ensuring quality of life through attention to detail and meaningful interactions. By focusing on the individual needs of the resident, this equips staff with the skills to provide exceptional, person-centered care throughout a resident's journey.



Podcast is moving up the charts



The Strengthening a Palliative Approach to Long-Term Care podcast has steadily been gaining attention since its launch in December 2021. This podcast highlights unique ways to improve care for individuals living in LTC, from various perspectives.

To date, there are 37 podcasts available with over 4,000 total downloads. Episodes have been downloaded in 600 cities globally and over 40 countries. Nova Scotia

A big thank you to Nova Scotia Department of Seniors and Long-Term Care who financially supported the Strengthening a Palliative Approach in Long-Term Care project. The funds are provided through the Canada-Nova Scotia Aging and Dignity Funding Agreement. The funding will enable all staff in Long-Term Care across Nova Scotia to develop capacity and lead change in palliative care within their organization. This project will benefit residents living in long-term care and their families to receive high-quality palliative care.

New Brunswick

Dr. Pam Durepos (UNB) and Dr. Caroline Gibbons (U de M) received funding from the Government of New Brunswick for Phase 2 of their grant. They will expand the implementation of the SPA-LTC program in New Brunswick. This includes working alongside LTC leaders and healthcare providers to refine policies for a standardized palliative care program, working to sustain a palliative care program in LTC and increase access to palliative care.
